

Less than 48 hours before this photo was taken, Annette was comatose. Suffering with severe malaria and seizures, the outcome was uncertain.

When Annette's mother brought her to St. Martin de Porres Mission hospital in rural Cameroon, she was truly hoping for a miracle.

Fortunately, because of you, Mission Doctors, Martha Franz and Jim Hake were there.

They provided the necessary medical care and essential treatments to save Annette's life.

Five Steps to Discernment

How do you hear God's call in your life? How do you understand what you hear? For doctors, the process of discernment may be a familiar one. The steps taken to choose a career as a physician or dentist may have had points along the journey where decisions have been necessary; what school, what specialty, where to practice.



If you are discerning a call to serve as a Mission Doctor, either with the long or short-term program, you may be looking into something you have felt a call to most of your life. Perhaps this opportunity is something new to you. While those preparing to serve long-term with Mission Doctors will take time in our four-month formation program, and those considering serving short-term will attend a weekend Retreat / Seminar where discerning this call is discussed in greater depth, we offer this as a brief overview to aid you on this journey.

Recommended scriptural readings as you pray about hearing and following God's call in your life: Jeremiah 1: 4-10 with others: Acts 9 (Paul); Jonah 1: 1-7 (Jonah); Matthew 9: 9-13 (Matthew); and John 1: 43-51 (Philip, Andrew, Nathaniel and Peter)

AWARENESS

1 Questions to ask yourself: What is drawing me to share my professional skills with people of another country? Have I asked God for assistance as I strive to listen to this calling?

INFORMATION

2 Questions to ask yourself: How can I share my gifts? Where I am best suited to serve? What motives are driving me in my choices? What support will I need? Have I consulted with those who will be intimately affected by the decision being made: family, friends, and colleagues?

UNDERSTAND GOD'S WILL

3 Questions to ask yourself: What is the most loving choice I can make? Am I resisting God's invitation?

CONFIRMATION

4 Questions to ask yourself: What happens when I share the idea of serving as a Mission Doctor with other people? How do I interpret the positive and negative responses? Do I seek to find God's voice in the voices of those who know me and who love me? Do I find myself strengthened rather than weakened in my resolve? Is there peace, even in the midst of some doubts?

PRAYER

5 Continue to pray for the understanding of where God is calling you.

God has work for us to do. We practice discernment so we can determine what this work is.*

St. Ignatius teaches that the first principle is a desire to choose the good. For some, that choice may take you to share your professional skills in another country. For others, you may consider your calling is at home and possibly supporting those who serve abroad with your prayerful support.

St. Ignatius provided a great deal of direction on the best way to strive to hear God's voice as we make decisions. This web site provides additional information and articles on the process of Discernment.

A Journalist's View of Mission Doctors

Usually reporting for ABC Action News in Tampa, Florida, Emmy Award winning journalist Michael Paluska traveled to rural Cameroon this summer to document the lifesaving work of Mission Doctors. We sat down with Michael to discuss this trip and a trip to visit Mission Doctors in rural Peru.

We started by asking Michael how he learned about the work MDA. Michael is the cousin of Brian Medernach, a long-term Mission Doctor who recently completed a three year mission with his family at Santa Clotilde Mission in rural Peru.

While visiting Brian and documenting his work, Michael met one particular patient that he still remembers today, Mirelia Siquioha. Unfortunately, Mirelia lost her leg below the knee because of a venomous snake bite. Her family lived so far away from the clinic up the Napo River that her foot swelled and turned black by the time she and her father made the trip in a dugout canoe.

What Michael remembers most is her smile. She walks with a prosthetic leg and at first was too shy to show her leg to Michael. After a couple days of talking and laughing, they became friends, and Mirelia bravely showed her leg and shared her story. He shared "I know we were all proud of her for trusting us to tell her story."

I listened to stories of survival and honestly you can't help but want to cry tears of joy. Learning how much they put in, and sacrifice to save a life is truly amazing and that is what makes Mission Doctors Association such a powerful force around the globe.

Michael added "Not everyone can sacrifice three years of their lives to serve, but, all of us can donate and help out in our own way. We can share a link on Facebook. We can skip Starbucks one day and donate the cost of that skipped coffee to Mission Doctors. We can simply tell a friend, co-worker, or neighbor about the amazing stories of miracles these doctors perform every single day..."

Lastly, he told us "I will never feel the joy that Jim, Terry, Martha, Brian, and Toni felt from saving a patient's life, but, that has to be the most rewarding part. I listened to stories of survival and honestly, you can't help but want to cry tears of joy. Learning how much they put in, and sacrifice to save a life is truly amazing and that is what makes Mission Doctors Association such a powerful force around the globe."
