In May, Mission Doctors, Antoinette Lullo and Brian Medernach completed their long-term mission to Santa Clotilde Clinic in rural Loreto, Peru. They left the United States a young couple and returned a family of four.

When asked about serving as a family, Antoinette shared "You learn how to live simply, enjoy life, pray, laugh and cry together. Also, it builds a bond with the families you serve and creates lifelong connections for you and your kids to always be able to foster and grow."

Santa Clotilde Clinic is situated on the Napo River in the Amazon region of Peru. This remote health center serves over 20,000 indigenous people living along the river. Santa Clotilde is a beacon of health, located over eight hours from the nearest major health center.

Brian and Antoinette shared many of the joys and challenges of mission service. "The most rewarding has been forming relationships with people in the communities, co-workers and patients. It is immensely gratifying to see the smile of relief on the face of a parent as their child pulls through a severe illness and begins to eat and play again. together fills all of our staff with a sense of collective pride and accomplishment. It keeps us all going." In addition to the challenges of being a doctor, Antoinette and Brian shared that "It was professionally challenging to work within a context of low-resources, knowing that outcomes may have been drastically different if the same patients were presented to a fully-equipped hospital back home."

While reflecting on these challenges, Brian shared "I think it is hard to put into words the gratitude and kindness of the people we serve. The presence of a Mission Doctor

makes a huge difference, because otherwise communities might not have access to health care. The presence of a Mission Doctor empowers the community, gives them hope, and enables them to feel the love of Christ in a unique way."

Good news for taxpayers over the age of 70 1/2! Congress has voted to make permanent the exclusion from income for Individual Retirement Account (IRA) distributions given directly to charities. (Up to \$100,000).

IRA Charitable Rollover

An IRA charitable rollover is a way you can help continue our life-saving work.

Benefits of an IRA Charitable Rollover

- Avoid taxes on transfers of up to \$100,000 from your IRA to Mission Doctors Association.
- Satisfy your required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year.
- Reduce your taxable income, even if you do not itemize deductions.
- Make a gift that is not subject to the 50% deduction limits on charitable gifts.
- Help further the work and mission of Catholic Doctors and their families serving Christ's poor around the world.
